Food Technology Award

FOLLOWING the excellent 100% A*-C GCSE grades in Food Technology in 2004, I was delighted to discover that one student, Justine Dattani, had won a British Nutrition Foundation GCSE Prize Award, after being nominated by the examination board, OCR.

The British Nutrition Foundation is an independent scientific charity that promotes the well-being of society via scientifically

based nutritional knowledge and advice. Its activities influence all in the food chain, the professions, government and the media.

The awards are based on the information supplied by examining bodies around the UK and are given to candidates who gain the highest marks for their practical coursework and written examination nationally, in either GCSE

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“Happy Slapping” and Mobile Telephones

This disgraceful practice (Person A commits a surprise assault upon Person B while Person C takes a photograph, using a mobile telephone.) is absolutely forbidden. **Students who are involved in this type of assault, while under the School’s jurisdiction (which includes journeys to and from School) will be excluded from the School for a minimum of 5 days, for the first offence.**

“Happy Slapping” would not be possible if students in Years 7 – 11 obeyed the School rule that mobile telephones are not permitted. I realise that this is not a simple matter. Mobile telephones can be a real convenience for families and in some cases they may increase student safety, though the police have advised that mobile telephones are themselves the major cause of assaults upon young people in Barnet. Mobile telephones have become a sig-

nificant source of disruption, indiscipline and bullying in many schools and to ensure that this does not happen at MHCHS, we intend to stick to our policy..

If a student is found with a mobile telephone, it will be confiscated; the student will be required to collect it at the end of the day from pastoral staff. If a telephone rings in a lesson, or if a student is found sending a text message, in addition to confiscation, the student will be given an hour’s Saturday morning detention. While under the School’s jurisdiction, the sending of unkind or malicious text messages to another member of the School community will be treated with the utmost severity.

On a number of recent occasions, parents have contacted the School to say that the ringing of a student’s mobile telephone in a lesson was their fault and that the student should not be pun-

ished. We do not believe that the parental involvement excuses the student misconduct; while it is disappointing that parents should contribute to the breaking of School rules, it was still the students who, contrary to the rules, brought a phone in the first place and had it switched on in lessons.

In two recent cases, parents have caused their children’s mobile telephones to ring during public examinations, resulting in the disqualification of the students by the Examination Boards. I could scarcely believe my ears when I was told about these incidents. In case there is any doubt, please let me make the Examination Boards’ position clear: in order to discourage cheating and to reduce the possibility of distracting other candidates, **students who are found to have mobile telephones on their person during public examinations will be disqualified.**



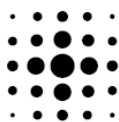
